City wins CATEE award

The Clean Air Through Energy Efficiency organization awarded the City of Cedar Hill the 2012 CATEE Award for Small Cities at the recent conference in Galveston.

Since 2009, the Cedar Hill City Council has prioritized an environmentally friendly future and clean air for its citizens by Growing Green! Per the City's Sustainability Action Plan, all projects have to make sense Socially, Environmentally and Economically.

The City has pursued federal and state

grants to fund virtually all of the costs of these green initiatives under the direction of Assistant City Manager Melissa Stephens.

A 152 kW solar PV system at the Government Center reduces purchased energy consumption by over 210,000 kilowatt hours, about \$21,000 per year.

A 4.5 kW wind turbine at the Government Center produces over 4,400 kilowatt hours, worth more than \$400 per year.

Electric vehicle charging stations are positioned for the citi-



zens' and City use at the Government Center

A green fleet initiative purchased the City's first two all electric Nissan Leafs and will add hybrid vehicles whenever possible.

Teamwork cracks marble vandals' spree

Kingswood residents were recently plagued by a rash of broken car and house windows. Over a two-day period in October over 50 related incidents of criminal mischief were reported.

Police found that the breakage was caused by marbles.

Cedar Hill police officers Foley and Valenti came up with the idea of checking on a possible source for the projectiles.

They spoke with the local Wal*Mart manager who produced a record of marbles being sold and was able to help identify the purchaser and his vehicle.

Detectives interviewed two people who provided information and soon a suspect was located, followed and arrested. Officers found a sling shot, air rifle, knives and marbles in the vehicle.

While he was being interviewed, other suspects came to the sta-

tion to find out what was going on. They agreed to be interviewed and admitted to participating in the offenses.

According to Lt. Charles Reiss, this is another example of "thinking outside the box," teamwork among police officers and de-

Public meeting focuses on cooperation and revitalization

In September, over 50 Cedar Hill East residents and businesses owners along South Clark attended a public meeting to discuss improvements and plans for this key portion of our community.

Hosted by Mayor Rob Franke, City Council members and key City staff members, the meeting was an opportunity to elaborate on current and future improvements and get input from stakeholders.

The City's immediate objectives are to begin infrastructure improvements including road surfaces and drainage, engage resi-

dents in crime prevention initiatives, improve traffic flow and stimulate economic development.

To do that, according to Mayor Franke, will require partnerships between neighbors and the police, pride in property and cooperation between the City, businesses and developers.

He said City administration wants to help put businesses back in the area, revitalize neighborhood properties and relationships, develop an ongoing communication process and form bonds in the area.

Several departments had display booths including the police, with information on starting crime watch groups. Neighborhood Services stressed

communication and organizing neighborhoods. CHISD police were present to answer questions about high school traffic and students' off-campus activities.

The Public Works department discussed moving drainage underground to improve the esthetics of the roadway and the Planning Dept. showed a layout for a planned dedicated right turn lane from Belt Line onto Clark.

Popular fence idea

The Building dept. and Code Enforcement unveiled a plan for uniform fencing along portions of the west side of the roadway. Funds were subsequently approved at the next City Council meeting.

Community-wide change is pursued by re-structuring city's solid waste contract to be more recycle-friendly and reducing the trash pickup by 50%, lowering the City's carbon emissions significantly.

With the help of NCTCOG, the City will deploy 12 "Big Belly" Solar Recycle Compactor cans at 164-acre Valley Ridge Park to reduce maintenance costs.

The citywide solid waste changes initiated with the solar recycle cans and upgraded household recycling service have saved the City over 752,000 pounds of carbon dioxide per year.

Annually, all of the City's Growing Green projects combined have lowered carbon emissions by

over 1,070,000 pounds or 486 metric tons; reduced energy consumption by over 235,000 kilowatt hours, and diverted thousands of cubic yards of trash from the landfill.
